What Is a Worldview?

A worldview is the lens through which we interpret reality—a comprehensive framework of beliefs that shapes how we understand God, humanity, truth, morality, and purpose. It answers life's fundamental questions: Where did we come from? Why are we here? What is wrong with the world? How can it be fixed?

Everyone operates with a worldview, whether consciously or not. For Christians, our worldview must be deliberately constructed on the solid foundation of God's revealed Word, not on cultural trends or personal preferences.

The Early Church and Apostolic Faith



The apostolic church was built on the eyewitness testimony of those who walked with Jesus. These early believers proclaimed Christ crucified and risen, standing firm even unto martyrdom. Their teachings—preserved in the New Testament—became the doctrinal foundation for all subsequent generations.

The early church fathers defended orthodox Christianity against heresies, affirming essential doctrines like the Trinity, the deity of Christ, and salvation by grace through faith. Their commitment to biblical authority set the trajectory for evangelical faith today.

The Reformation Changed Everything



Sola Scriptura: Scripture Alone



Scripture Is Sufficient

The Bible contains everything necessary for salvation and godly living. We need no additional revelation or human tradition to supplement God's Word.



Scripture Is Clear

The essential message of Scripture can be understood by all believers through the illumination of the Holy Spirit, not just religious elites.



Scripture Is Authoritative

God's Word stands above all human authority—including church councils, traditions, and contemporary culture—as the final arbiter of truth.

The Enlightenment's Challenge

The Enlightenment elevated human reason as the supreme authority for determining truth. Philosophers championed scientific empiricism and rational skepticism, often dismissing supernatural claims and biblical revelation as outdated superstition.

This intellectual shift challenged Christianity to demonstrate that faith and reason were not opponents but allies. While the Enlightenment brought valuable contributions to science and philosophy, its rejection of divine revelation left humanity without a transcendent moral anchor.

The Modern Evangelical Response

Evangelicals responded to modernist skepticism by affirming biblical inerrancy, the historical reality of miracles, and the exclusive claims of Christ. Theologians like B.B. Warfield and J. Gresham Machen defended orthodox doctrine while engaging contemporary scholarship.

The evangelical movement maintained that Christianity is both intellectually credible and spiritually transformative. This balanced approach continues to shape how believers engage with science, philosophy, and culture today—holding fast to Scripture while thoughtfully addressing modern questions and challenges.



From Modernism to Postmodernism

Modernism

Believed in objective truth discoverable through reason and science. Humanity could achieve progress through rational thought.

Disillusionment

Two world wars and moral failures shattered confidence in human reason and inevitable progress.

Postmodernism

Rejects universal truth claims. Reality is constructed by language, culture, and power dynamics rather than discovered.

Philosophical Roots of Postmodernism



Nietzsche's Nihilism

Declared "God is dead," arguing that without God, there are no objective values—only the will to power.

Foucault's Power Analysis

Argued that truth claims are actually expressions of power by dominant groups to control others.

Derrida's Deconstruction

Claimed texts have no fixed meaning; interpretation is unstable and influenced by the reader's perspective.

Core Postmodern Beliefs

Relativism

Truth is relative to individuals or cultures. What's true for you may not be true for me. No perspective can claim universal validity.

Skepticism

We cannot truly know objective reality. All knowledge claims are suspect and potentially oppressive metanarratives.

Deconstruction

Meaning is unstable and texts can be interpreted endlessly. Traditional authorities and institutions should be dismantled.

The Rejection of Absolute Truth



"What is truth?"

— Pontius Pilate

Postmodernism's central claim is that there is no universal, objective truth accessible to all people. Instead, truth is seen as socially constructed, culturally conditioned, and personally determined. This philosophical position undermines the very possibility of evangelism, moral accountability, and rational discourse.

Ironically, postmodernists assert their relativism as absolutely true—a self-refuting contradiction that reveals the incoherence at the heart of their worldview. Christianity, by contrast, proclaims that truth exists because God exists, and He has revealed Himself clearly in Scripture and supremely in Jesus Christ, who declared, "I am the way, the truth, and the life."



Postmodernism in Culture



Media

Entertainment promotes moral relativism, celebrating "your truth" and questioning traditional values as oppressive constructs.



Education

Critical theories dominate academia, teaching students to deconstruct Western values and view all truth claims with suspicion.



Social Media

Online echo chambers reinforce subjective realities, fragmenting shared truth and amplifying personal narratives over objective facts.

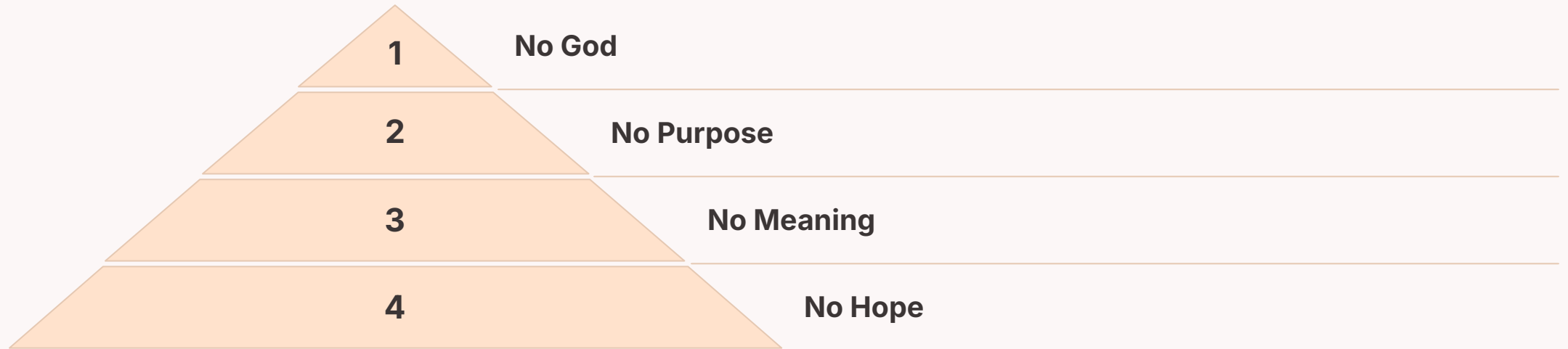
Biblical Christianity

The Loss of Meaning



When God is removed from the worldview, existential despair inevitably follows. Without a transcendent Creator, human existence becomes a cosmic accident with no inherent meaning, purpose, or destiny. Postmodernism offers no satisfying answer to the deep longing for significance that God has placed in every human heart. Only the Gospel restores true meaning—we are created in God's image, redeemed by Christ's sacrifice, and destined for eternal fellowship with our Maker.



The Collapse of Objective Morality

If there is no God, there is no transcendent moral law. Postmodernism logically leads to moral chaos where right and wrong become matters of personal preference or cultural consensus. Without an objective moral standard, we cannot consistently condemn atrocities like genocide or child abuse—they become merely cultural differences.

Scripture teaches that God's holy character is the foundation for morality. His commandments reflect His nature and are binding on all people everywhere. The moral law is written on human hearts, creating an innate sense of justice that postmodernism cannot explain away.

Present Christ as the answer to their deepest needs and questions.

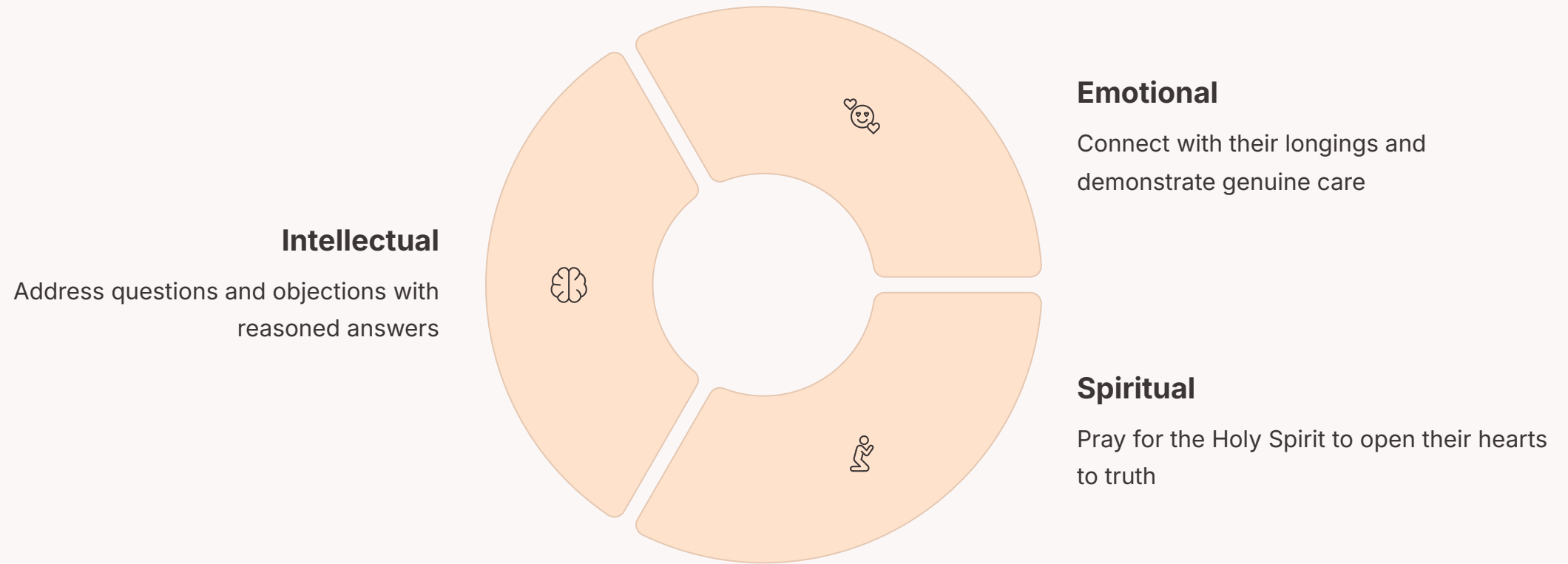


The Power of the Holy Spirit

The Role of Love in Apologetics

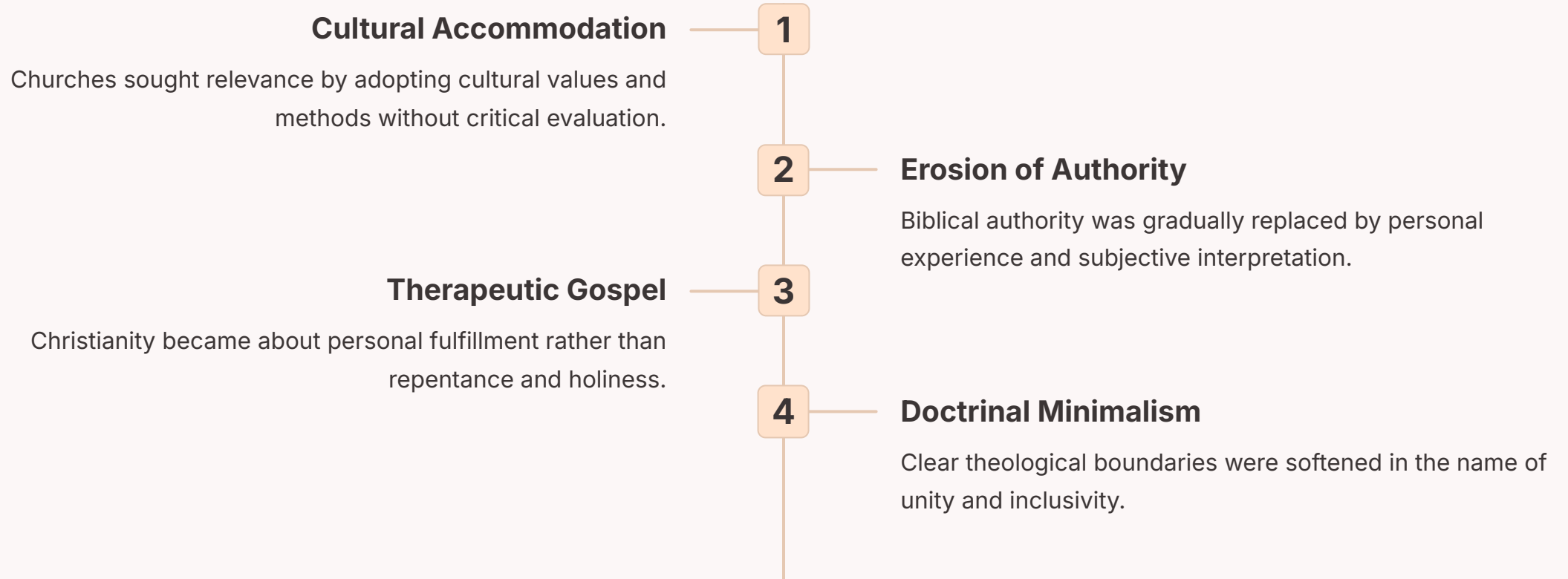

How Postmodernism Entered the Church





The Danger of Compromise

When churches compromise biblical truth to appear culturally acceptable, they lose their prophetic voice and transformative power. The early church turned the world upside down precisely because it refused to conform to surrounding culture.

Doctrinal drift happens gradually—small concessions accumulate over time until core truths are abandoned. We must guard the deposit of faith entrusted to us, refusing to trade eternal truth for temporary cultural approval.

The Rise of Pragmatism in Worship

Entertainment Focus

Worship services designed primarily to attract and entertain rather than glorify God and edify believers.

Consumer Mentality

Church members become consumers shopping for experiences rather than committed disciples.

Shallow Theology

Sermons focus on felt needs and practical tips while neglecting deep biblical teaching.

Numeric Success

Attendance and finances become the primary measures of faithfulness rather than spiritual maturity.

Returning to Expository Preaching



Expository preaching systematically explains and applies Scripture, allowing God's Word—not cultural trends or pastor preferences—to set the agenda. This approach forms biblically literate congregations equipped to discern truth from error.

Churches must prioritize the clear proclamation of Scripture over entertainment value. The Word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword. When faithfully preached, it transforms lives and builds mature disciples who can withstand cultural pressure.

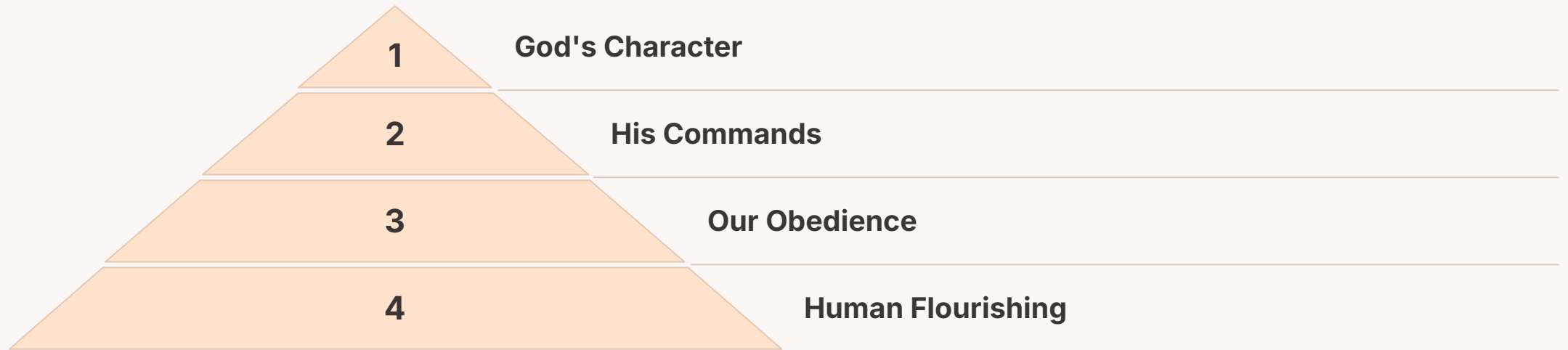
The Mind of Christ

The church provides a counter-cultural community where holiness is normal and celebrated.

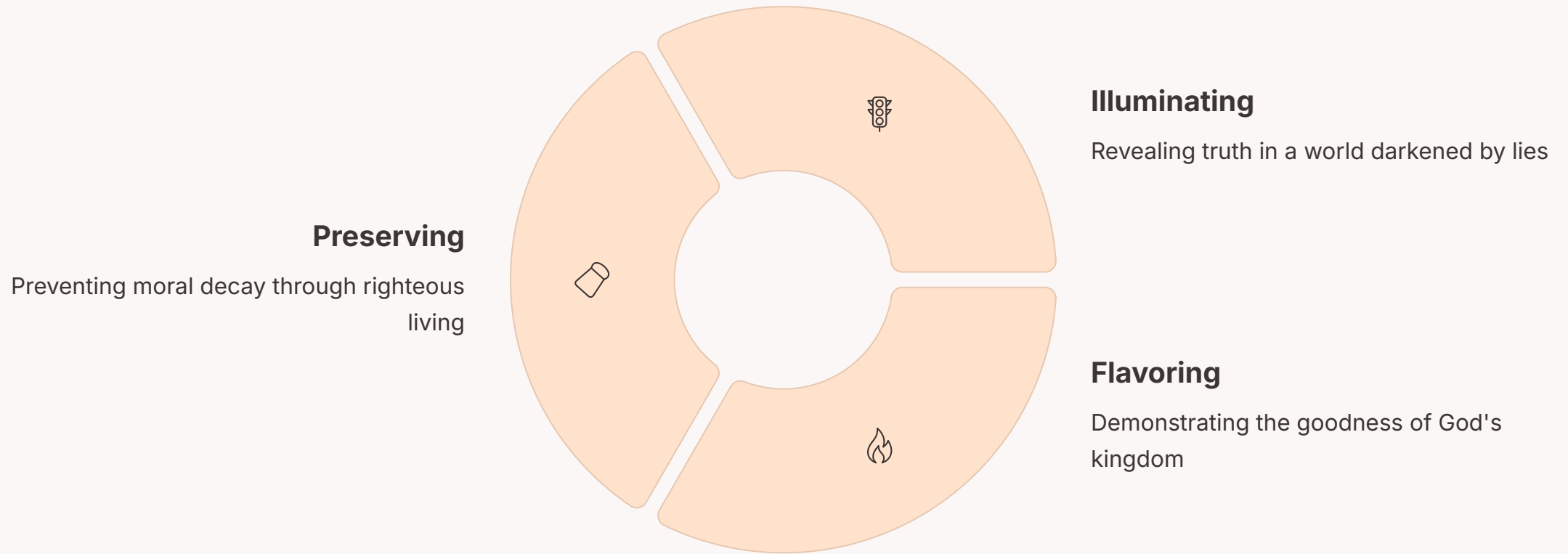


Understanding Culture Through a Biblical Lens

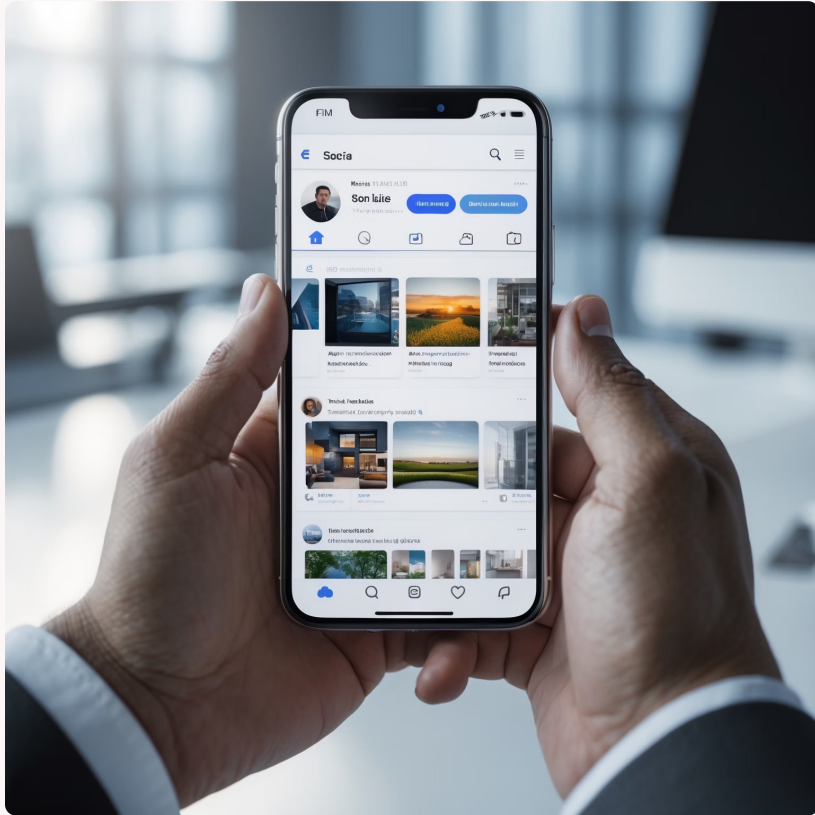
