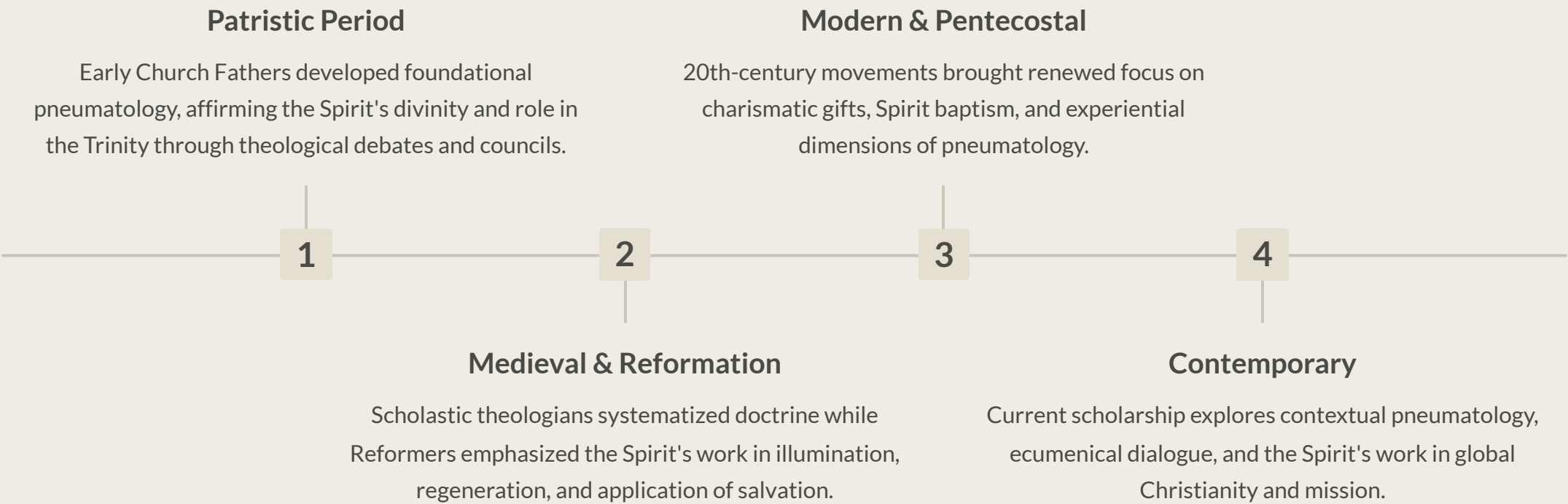

The Spirit in the Old Testament

Presence in Creation

Genesis 1:2 reveals the Spirit hovering over the waters at creation, actively participating in bringing order from chaos and life from void.

Empowerment of Leaders

The Spirit came upon judges, kings, and prophets, empowering them for specific tasks in God's redemptive purposes for Israel (Judges 3:10).

Prophetic Inspiration

The Spirit inspired prophets to speak God's word, preparing Israel for the coming Messiah and the age of the Spirit.





The Messianic Promise

"And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD."

Part II: The Holy Spirit in Salvation History

Baptism in the Holy Spirit

1

John's Prophecy

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but he who is coming after me is mightier than I... he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Matthew 3:11).

2

Jesus's Promise

"For John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now" (Acts 1:5).

3

Pentecost Fulfillment

The promised baptism arrived at Pentecost, empowering the Church with divine presence and missionary power for witness.

The Spirit in Jesus's Ministry

Jesus's earthly ministry was characterized by constant dependence on and empowerment by the Holy Spirit. From conception to resurrection, the Spirit accompanied and enabled Christ's redemptive work.

- Conceived by the Spirit (Luke 1:35)
- Descended upon Him at baptism (Matthew 3:16)
- Led Him into wilderness testing (Matthew 4:1)
- Anointed Him for ministry (Luke 4:18)
- Given without measure (John 3:34)

Christ's Spirit-empowered ministry models the believer's Spirit-dependent life and service.



The Anointed One

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

— Luke 4:18-19





Pentecost: The Spirit Poured Out

The Event

Acts 2:1-4 describes the dramatic arrival of the Spirit—with rushing wind and tongues of fire—empowering the disciples for bold witness and inaugurating the Church age.

The Significance

Pentecost fulfilled Joel's prophecy, reversed Babel's confusion, and demonstrated that the new covenant age had arrived with the Spirit dwelling in believers.

The Results

Three thousand were converted, the Church was born, and the gospel began spreading from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth through Spirit-empowered witness.

Apostolic Pneumatology

The New Testament epistles reveal the Spirit's multifaceted work in the life of believers and the Church. Paul especially develops rich pneumatological theology.



Romans 8:9-17

The Spirit indwells believers, brings life, leads God's children, testifies to adoption, and helps in weakness—grounding assurance of salvation.



Galatians 5:16-25

Walking by the Spirit overcomes fleshly desires and produces spiritual fruit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.



1 Corinthians 12

The Spirit distributes diverse gifts for the common good, creating unity in diversity within the body of Christ for edification and mission.



The Spirit in the Early Church

The book of Acts demonstrates the Spirit's active guidance, empowerment, and presence in the expanding Church. The Spirit directed mission strategy, appointed leaders, performed miracles, and transformed communities.

Acts 4:31

Believers were filled with the Spirit and spoke God's word with boldness after prayer, demonstrating ongoing empowerment beyond Pentecost.

Acts 13:2

The Spirit called and commissioned Paul and Barnabas for missionary work, showing divine initiative in spreading the gospel.

The Spirit as Witness and Comforter

Jesus's Upper Room Discourse

In John 16:7-15, Jesus reveals the Spirit's coming work: convicting the world of sin, righteousness, and judgment; guiding believers into all truth; glorifying Christ; and declaring what is to come.

The Spirit doesn't speak on His own authority but reveals Christ, making Him known to believers and through believers to the world.

The Helper (Parakletos)

Jesus calls the Spirit "another Helper"—one who comes alongside to assist, comfort, advocate, counsel, and strengthen believers in their journey.

This personal designation emphasizes the Spirit's relational nature and active involvement in believers' lives.



Part III: The Person of the Holy Spirit

Exploring the Spirit's divine nature, personal attributes, and relationship within the Godhead.

The Spirit as Divine Person

1

Third Person of the Trinity

The Spirit is fully God, co-equal and co-eternal with the Father and Son, sharing the same divine essence while maintaining personal distinction.

2

Biblical Evidence of Personality

Scripture attributes personal characteristics to the Spirit: He speaks (Acts 13:2), teaches (John 14:26), intercedes (Romans 8:26), can be grieved (Ephesians 4:30), and makes decisions (Acts 15:28).

3

Trinitarian Relations

The Spirit proceeds from the Father (and the Son in Western theology), executing the will of the Trinity in creation, redemption, and sanctification.

Why Personality Matters

“

Person or Power?

Recognizing the Spirit as a divine Person rather than merely an impersonal force or power transforms our relationship with Him. We don't simply use the Spirit's power—we commune with Him, listen to Him, obey Him, and are indwelt by Him. This understanding shapes prayer, worship, and spiritual growth.

”

Evidence of the Spirit's Personality

- **Personal Actions**

He speaks, teaches, guides, convicts, comforts, intercedes, distributes gifts, calls ministers, and makes decisions.

- **Personal Attributes**

He possesses intellect (1 Corinthians 2:10-11), emotions (Ephesians 4:30; Romans 15:30), and will (1 Corinthians 12:11).

- **Personal Relationships**

He can be obeyed, resisted, lied to, blasphemed, and grieved—all actions possible only with a person.



Divine Attributes of the Holy Spirit

Holiness

Named "Holy Spirit," He embodies perfect moral purity and consecrates believers for God's purposes (1 Corinthians 6:11).

Omnipotence

He possesses unlimited power, creating the universe, raising Christ from death, and transforming human hearts.

Omniscience

He searches all things, even the depths of God, and reveals divine truth to believers (1 Corinthians 2:10-11).

Omnipresence

He fills heaven and earth, indwelling all believers simultaneously and filling the Church universally.



Wisdom and Revelation

"And the Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD."

— Isaiah 11:2

The Spirit imparts divine wisdom, illuminates Scripture, reveals Christ, and guides believers into all truth. Ephesians 1:17 speaks of "the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him."

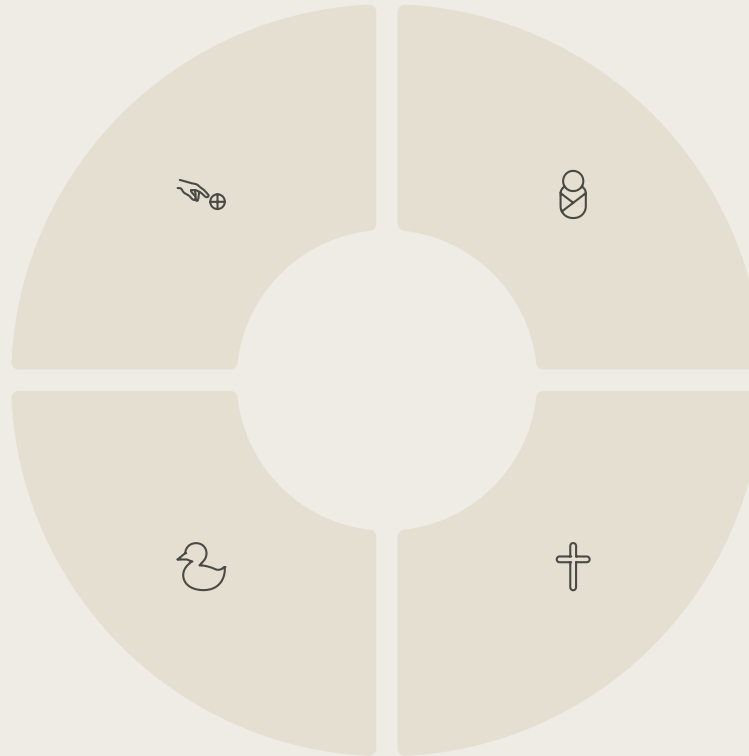
The Spirit's Work Within the Trinity

In Redemption

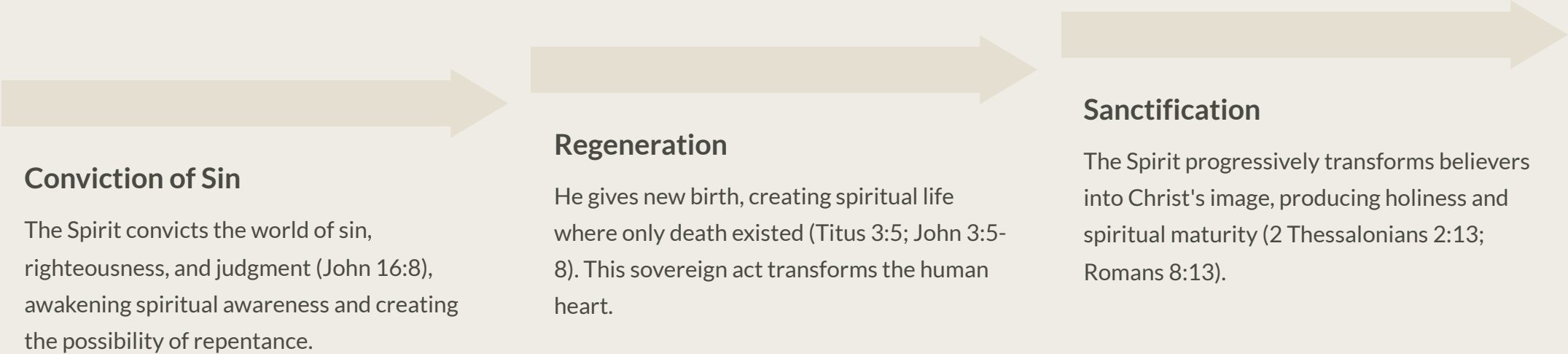
The Spirit empowered Christ's ministry, sustained Him through suffering, and raised Him from death (Romans 8:11).

The Spirit's Work in Salvation



Conviction of Sin

The Spirit convicts the world of sin, righteousness, and judgment (John 16:8), awakening spiritual awareness and creating the possibility of repentance.

Regeneration

He gives new birth, creating spiritual life where only death existed (Titus 3:5; John 3:5-8). This sovereign act transforms the human heart.

Conviction: The Spirit's Awakening Work

Jesus promised that when the Spirit comes, He will "convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment" (John 16:8). This conviction isn't mere guilt but divine illumination that reveals:

- The reality and seriousness of sin
- Personal guilt and need for salvation
- Christ's righteousness and our lack thereof
- Coming judgment and eternal consequences

Without the Spirit's convicting work, the gospel message remains foolishness to the natural person (1 Corinthians 2:14).





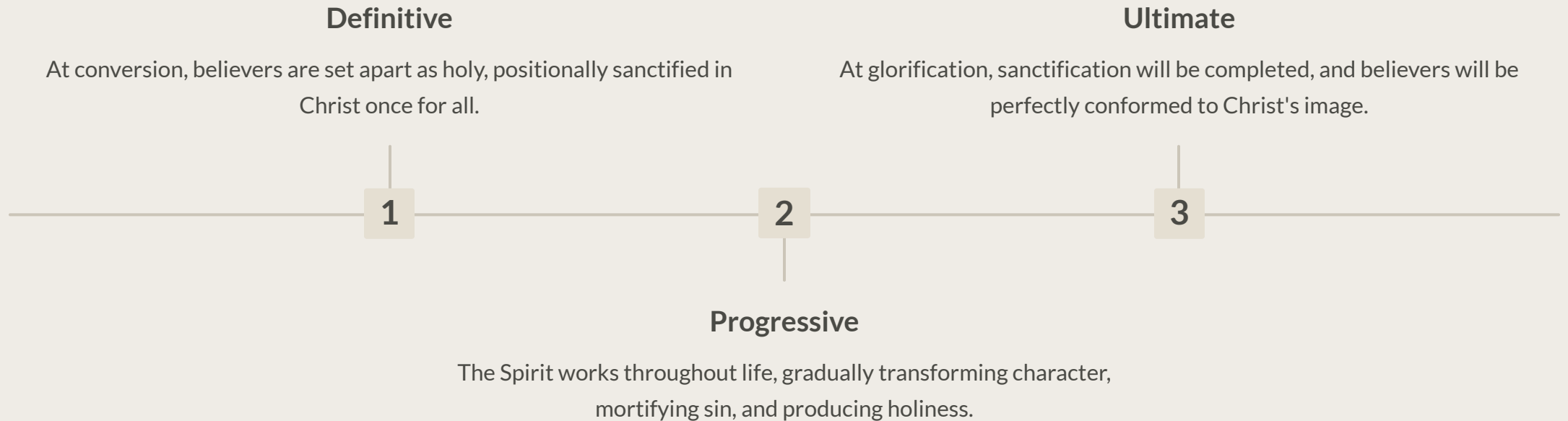
Born Again by the Spirit

"But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit."

— Titus 3:4-5

Regeneration is the Spirit's sovereign work of imparting spiritual life to the spiritually dead. This new birth creates a new heart, new desires, new nature—making the believer a new creation in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17).

Progressive Sanctification



Second Thessalonians 2:13 describes this: "God chose you as the firstfruits to be saved, through sanctification by the Spirit and belief in the truth."

The Spirit's Work in the Church



Unity

The Spirit creates and maintains the unity of believers across all barriers, making the Church one body despite diversity (Ephesians 4:3-6).



Edification

Through gifts, ministries, and mutual encouragement, the Spirit builds up the body of Christ toward maturity (Ephesians 4:12-16).



Spiritual Gifts

The Spirit distributes diverse gifts to believers for service, ministry, and the common good of the Church (1 Corinthians 12; Romans 12:6-8).

Spiritual Gifts: Diversity in Unity

Paul's Teaching

First Corinthians 12 presents a comprehensive theology of spiritual gifts. The Spirit sovereignly distributes various gifts to each believer as He wills, creating interdependence and unity within diversity.

Key gifts include wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, miracles, prophecy, discernment, tongues, and interpretation—all for building up the Church.

Romans 12 Gifts

Paul lists additional gifts in Romans 12:6-8: prophecy, service, teaching, exhortation, giving, leadership, and mercy. These complement the Corinthian list, showing the breadth of the Spirit's equipping.

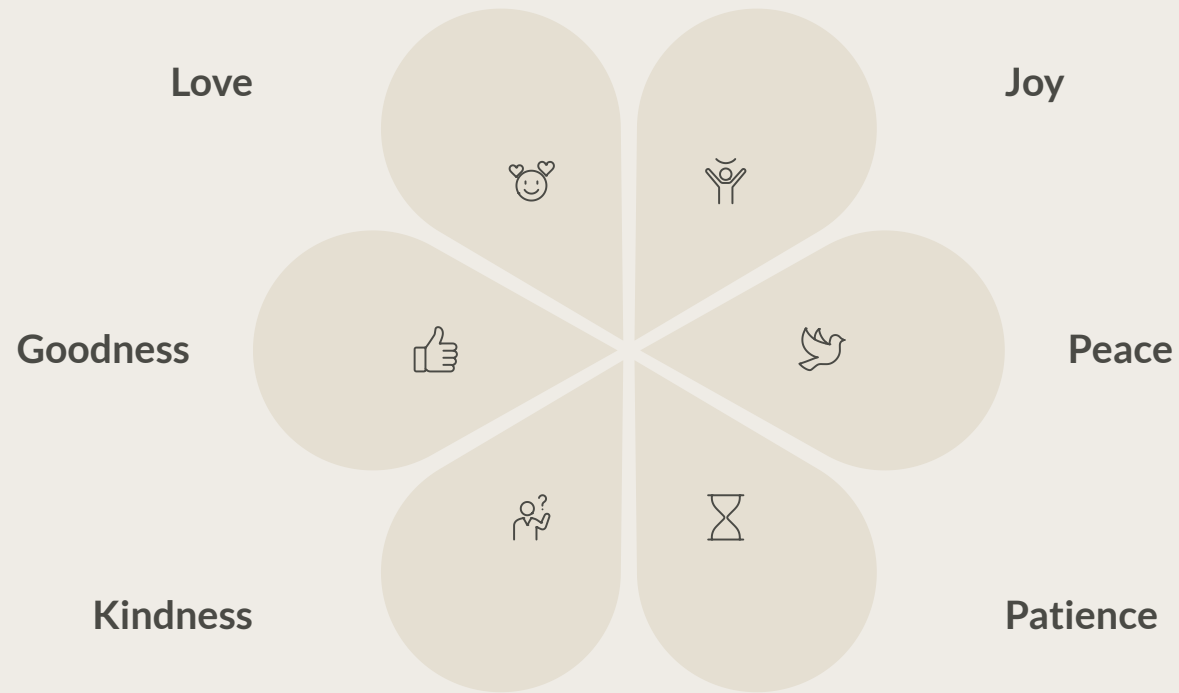
All gifts should be exercised in love, for the common good, and with humility.



The Fruit of the Spirit

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law."

These character qualities are produced by the Spirit's transforming work, not human effort. They demonstrate authentic spiritual life and maturity.

Spiritual Gifts and Church Leadership

01

Distribution of Gifts

The Spirit sovereignly distributes gifts to each believer according to His will, not based on merit, maturity, or human preference (1 Corinthians 12:11).

03

Charismatic Leadership

The Spirit calls and equips leaders—apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, teachers—gifts to the Church for equipping the saints (Ephesians 4:11-12).

02

Diverse Functions

Gifts serve different functions—some for public ministry, others for private service; some miraculous, others ordinary; but all essential for the body's health.

04

Balanced Ministry

Healthy churches maintain balance through discernment, testing prophecies, exercising gifts in love, and prioritizing edification over personal experience.



Discernment and Balance

The Spirit gifts the Church with discernment to test teachings, evaluate prophecies, and distinguish truth from error (1 John 4:1). This gift protects against deception while allowing authentic Spirit-led ministry to flourish.

Biblical balance requires both openness to the Spirit's work and careful testing of claims. Churches should neither quench the Spirit through skepticism nor embrace everything claiming to be Spirit-inspired without discernment.

📖 **Paul's instruction:** "Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies, but test everything; hold fast what is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:19-21).

The Spirit and the Sacraments

Baptism

Water baptism symbolizes and seals the Spirit's inward work of regeneration and union with Christ. While distinct from Spirit baptism, it publicly marks entrance into the Spirit-indwelt community.

Eucharist

The Spirit makes Christ spiritually present in the Lord's Supper, nourishing believers and strengthening their union with Christ and one another through this sacred meal.

Spirituality and Daily Life

The Spirit as Guide

Cultivating Spiritual Sensitivity



Developing sensitivity to the Spirit's voice and promptings requires intentional cultivation through spiritual disciplines:

- Consistent prayer and listening
- Worship and thanksgiving
- Obedience to known truth
- Fellowship with other believers

Fruit-Based Ethics

Walking by the Spirit

"But I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other."

Walking by the Spirit means moment-by-moment dependence, yielding to His leading, and allowing Him to direct choices, responses, and priorities. This walk produces victory over sin and growth in Christlikeness.

Evangelism

Wisdom in Service

Discipleship

- Trusting the Spirit to produce growth

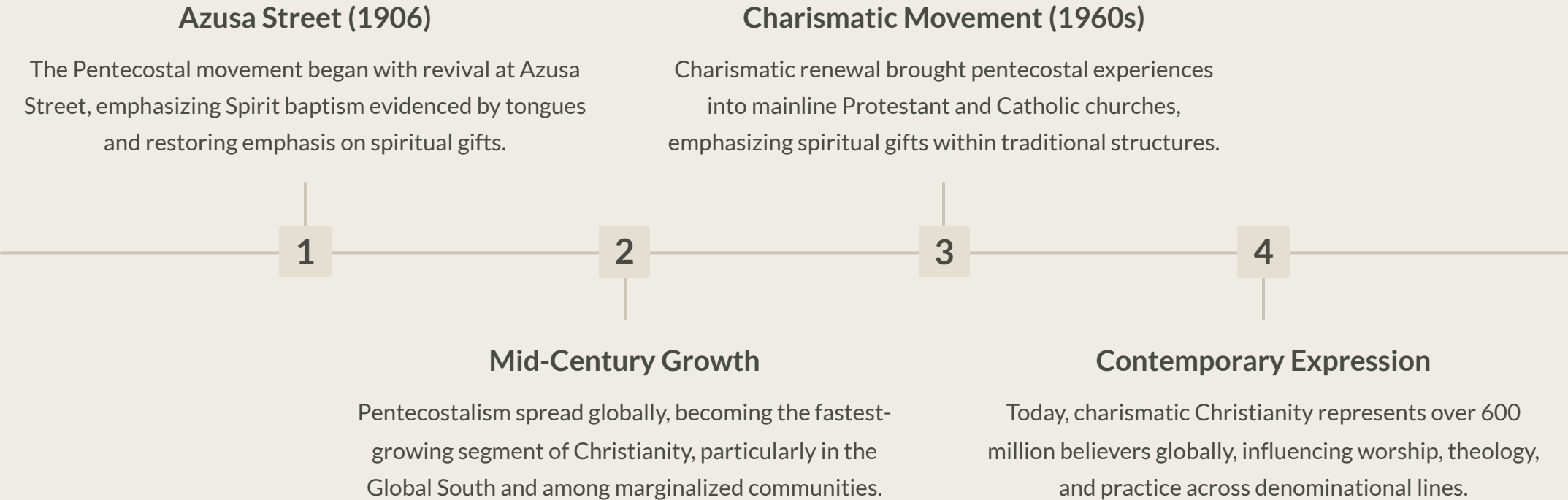

Firstfruits and Guarantee

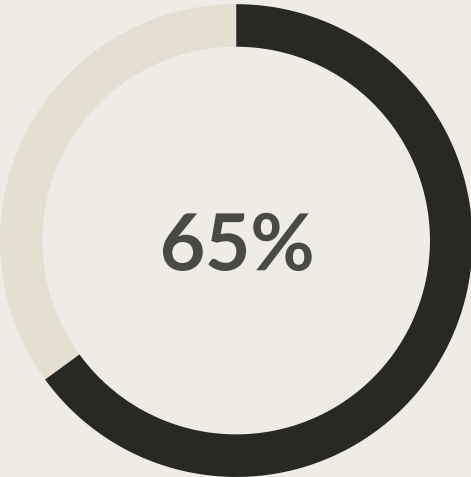

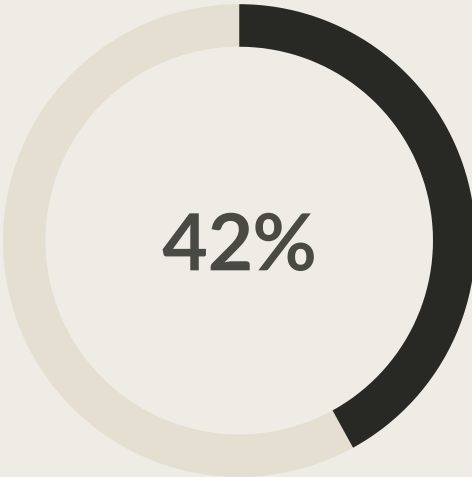

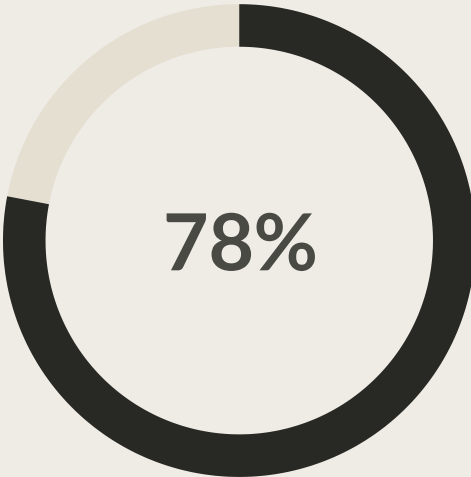
