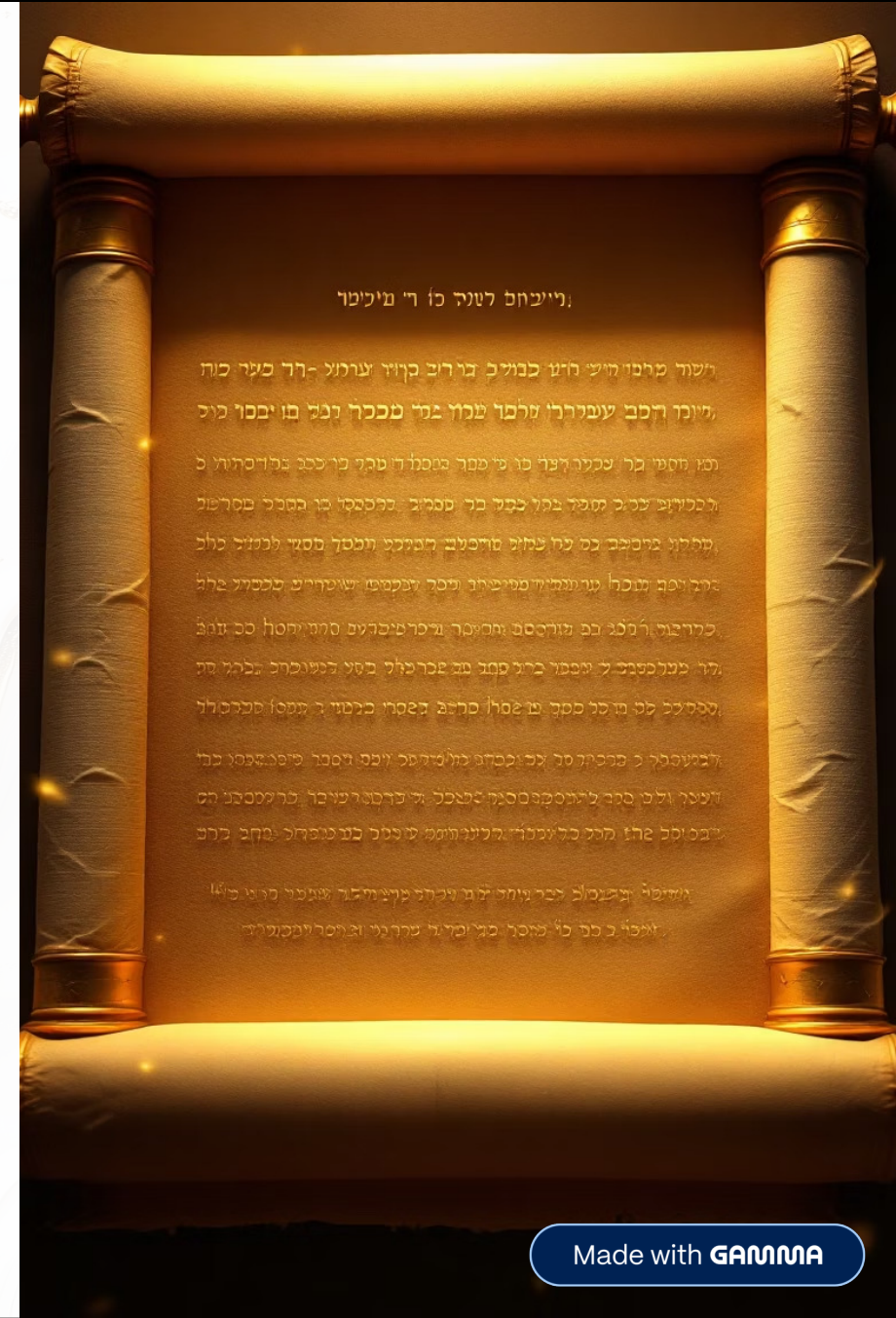

The Heart of the Proverbs 31 Woman: Fear of the Lord

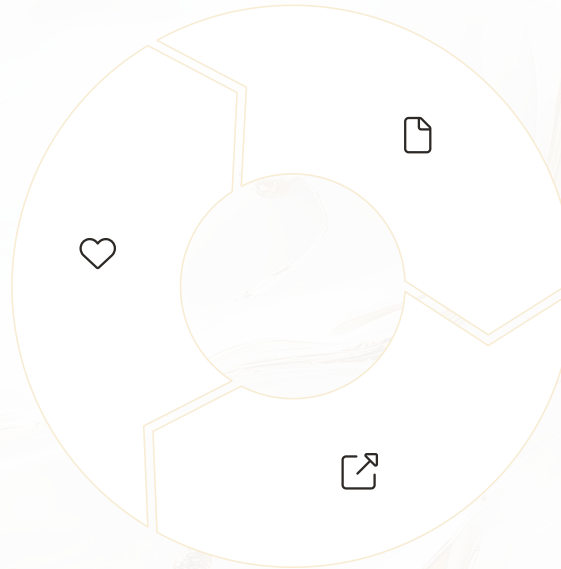
"Charm is deceptive, and beauty is fleeting; but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised."
